Veterans Day





The majority of MVN's funds come from Topsham Legion Post 202's Winter Classic softball tournament.

Safety & Wellbeing

An experience from a couple of days ago set the topic for this issue. Winter driving! I was driving down a rural road & saw an icy patch in front of me, in a shady area. Fortunately, the ice was white not black. The shady spot was on a rise & I was in a rear wheel drive vehicle. As I went up the rise the car lost traction. I had to back down to a dry section, but as I was backing, the crown of the road started sending me to the side. I was able to control the slide & make it to the bottom. Once at the bottom, I centered the car on the road to straddle the crown. I could see far enough ahead for oncoming traffic. I applied a little more speed, but still slow enough to control the car if it slid & made it on through. The point is; Maine's roads are notorious for significant crowns to allow water run-off. Under slippery conditions, vehicles can easily run-off as well. And how about 4-wheel drive? Many of us have 4-wheel drive trucks. If you try to take a corner at speed, the front drive wheel keeps spinning, loses traction, & wants to keep going straight. When turning at speed, let of the gas & let that front drive wheel bite. All wheel & front wheel drives might be a little better in light snow, but they are no match for ice either. Just a couple of things to think about, there are more. Please stay aware of conditions & stay safe.

MVRC Services

What's available at the **Mid-Coast Veterans** Resource Center in Brunswick? First, now that his new assistant is VA accredited, VFW Service Officer James Ware is again holding appointments monthly. A VA mental health councilor is in weekly. Paul Loveless, accredited RAO officer is in daily. Twice monthly, a Martin's Point Tri-care rep is in. A VA rep was coming in monthly, but stopped during the government shutdown. Hopefully that will start up again.
